The program will feature a series of speakers addressing a

broad range of topics, such as export market development, government assistance programs, shippers' associations, port services, and the latest in logistics technology.

"Small- and medium-size shippers and exporters, in particular, will be able to learn how they can export more effectively through cooperative shipping or shippers' associations," said Merrigan. "By pooling cargo, shippers can reduce their transportation costs and improve the

logistical services they receive." Both public- and privatesector international trade, regulatory, legal, and marketing specialists will address the gathering. Corn Conference Showcases Grower Checkoff-Funded Research

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — About 600 leaders in the corn industry took a long hard look into the future of corn processing at the Corn Utilization and Technology Conference (CUTC) June 5-7 in St. Paul, Minn.

Part of that future was revealed in reports on polyols, butanol, and extremophile research, studies funded by U.S. corn growers through checkoff

Jointly hosted by the National Corn Growers Association (NCGA) and the Corn Refiners Association (CRA), the CUTC gave corn growers, corn refiners, researchers and industry and government representatives the opportunity to explore new uses for corn, share technological techniques and discuss new ideas and methods for corn processing. NCGA grower-leaders and staff members who represent corn checkoff boards gained knowledge that will help them continue to invest grower funds in research.

'Corn growers directly benefit from conferences such as this," said Lee Klein, presidentelect of NCGA and a farmer from Battle Creek, Neb. "The techniques and opportunities discussed here in the general sessions and in casual conversations in the halls will increase the use of corn and help add to its value. And that value will be seen at the farm."

Said Rene Shunk, NCGA director of business development and corn processing research, "The CUTC is the one place that all people connected with corn production and processing can meet for one purpose: to discuss the uses of corn."

The conference once again emphasized the international business of corn and corn processing. The attendees represented 17 nations that ring the world, such as Argentina, United Kingdom, Austria, France, Israel, China, Japan, and South Korea.

Another conference highlight was the presentation of the CRA/NCGA award for Lifetime Achievement in Corn Utilization to Ernie S. Micek, Cargill president and chairman who will retire later this year. In presenting the award, Kyd Brenner, CRA vice president, noted Micek's contributions to the members of both organizations by reinvigorating the CRA research program and supporting CUTC to bring together the technical minds of the industry.

"Along the way he did a couple of things for Cargill and corn milling as well, such as overseeing the efforts to build the Eddyville, Iowa, and Blair, Neb., milling plants and leading a diversification and growth that has led to literally hundreds of millions of bushels of new corn demand," Brenner said.


