

Red And White Show Held At National Convention

BEDFORD (Bedford Co.) - An aged cow, Wendybrooke Duc LuLabel Red, owned by Rita A. Marlow and A&M DeBoer, was the selected grand champion at the RED & White show held at the Bedford Fairgrounds.

Reserve grand was a senior three year old, Morrill Ranger Camel, shown and owned by Kimberley Morrill of New Hampshire.

Morrill also took home grand champion junior honors while a two year old, Maple-Hill-Farm Tina-Red owned by Carl and Amanda Gates was junior reserve.

At a sale held on Saturday, 26 cows brought in a total of \$88,125 with an average of \$3389; five bred heifers, \$11,400; average, \$2280; 9 open heifers, \$24,550, average, \$2728; 39 heifer calves, \$100,375, average \$2574; and 8 choice of flush, \$30,350, average \$3794.

The sale was managed by the Cattle Exchange and featured the best Red and red factor genetics from the USA and Canada.

A new record sale average for a Red Sale held at a national convention was set. The previous high was \$2507 in 1980 when 30 head sold for export to Brazil.

Red And White Banquet Held In Bedford

BEDFORD (Bedford Co.)- National headquarters for the 2000 Red and White Convention Show/ Sale held July 27 through 29, was the Best Western Hotel with the show and sale being held at the Bedford Fairgrounds.

Premier breeder and exhibitor was announced as the Rob Morrill family from Penawok, New Hampshire. "We have a herd of 300 Holstein with 30 true Red and White and a lot of red factor," says Morrill. The Morrills have a life time average production of 143,897; 5879 fat; and 4470, protein. They have been four generations on the farm.

Daughter, Kimberly, took a Junior Showmanship award back to New Hampshire. Also taking a showmanship award was Jamie Merkle of Everett.

The Albrecht Memorial Award went to Elmer Carpenter

of 624 Raystown Road in Everett. A lovable, but, according to those who know him well, cantankerous 90, Elmer has a prestigious history with the Red and White Association.

He served as a director from 1967 until 1970 and as the first editor of The Red Bloodlines. His herd at Pineview Farm in the 60's was developed from various breeds which were blended together, often with 3 to 6 breeds combined.

A number of red Holsteins were in the herd. It was among the top herds for fat in Pennsylvania.

Elmer always maintained an adversarial attitude to "pure-bred" Holstein breeding the Holstein Association. Ever the champion of the underdog, he opposed the introduction of the Holstein gradeup program adopted in the late 60's, casting the lone "no" vote. His vision
