LANCASTER (Lancaster Co.) - Each year in the United States there are an estimated 6 to 33 million cases of food-borne illnesses that result in an estimated 9,000 deaths. The mishandling of food causes about 95% of all food-borne illnesses.

These statistics justify the concern that has arisen throughout our society over the safety of food. Penn State, The Lancaster Center, is offering a course in Food Safety Certification Training on September 13, 20, 27 and October 4 from 8:30 a.m.-12:30


This four-day course is designed to train food service managers, chefs, caterers, cooks, health officials and inspectors to ensure the standards and regulations of food safety.

The National Restaurant Association will certify participants who complete the ServSafe course and pass the exam in food safety and sanitation. The exam

is scheduled for October 11 from 8:30-10:30 a.m. at Penn State, The Lancaster Center.

The fee of \$150 per participant covers the cost of the ServSafe coursebook, instructional materials, and refreshment breaks.

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# STREAM MAP

LOST

The STREAM MAP OF PENN-SYLVANIA was completed in 1965 after a thirty-year effort by Howard Higbee, a former Penn State Professor.

The map is also known as the LOST STREAM MAP to some

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The map sold extremely well -until it was lost several years later. Incredibly, the printer entrusted with the original drawing and printing plates declared bankruptcy, then carelessly hauled Highee's 30 years of work to a landfill.

The few remaining dog-eared copies became a prized fisherman's possession. Professor Highee was offered \$400 for one of his last maps. And state agencies were forced to keep their copies under lock and key.

**Experts told Professor Higbee** that reprints were impossible, because the maps were printed in non-photographic blue.

Then, in 1991, at the age of 91, Howard Higbee's dream came true. Computers made it possible to reprint the map. Holding an updated map, Howard said, "I never thought I'd live to see this
