

Seventh Mid-Atlantic Brown Swiss Futurity At Maryland State Fair

The 2000 Maryland State Fair will be held in Timonium, Maryland, August 25 through September 4, and will be celebrating its 119th year.

Highlighting the dairy cattle division will be the seventh annual Mid Atlantic Brown Swiss Futurity.

"Brown Swiss breeders in Maryland and surrounding states are highly motivated and are looking forward with great anticipation to this event as it was very successful when premiered at the 1994 State Fair," said Cindy Warner, Chairperson of the Futurity Committee. "Because there are breeders from Maryland, as well as neighboring states showing Brown Swiss, we have named this

event, "The Mid Atlantic Brown Swiss Futurity."

The quality and caliber of Swiss exhibited at the Maryland State Fair is one of the best in the United States, and that's why we decided to showcase the Futurity here," said Warner. Participation continues to be strong, and by all indications of entries for future year's looks to be an event that will grow and develop, according to Warner.

The Brown Swiss Show is slated for Sunday, September 3, 2000 beginning at 12:30 in the Cow Palace with Judge Bob Griggs, Seminole, Okla. The Mid Atlantic Brown Swiss Futurity will be a show featuring two-year-olds.

This is a project of the Mary-

land Brown Swiss Association to stimulate interest in breeding and developing outstanding registered Brown Swiss for production and type, regardless of individual herd size. It recognizes the accomplishments of the small and large breeder, and FFA, as well as the 4-H participant.

"For the seventh year, we are very proud to announce there are 18 two-year-olds competing in this Futurity," said Warner. "This is definitely a strong indication of the interest and participation of breeders of Brown Swiss. We look for this event to grow and get better each year."

Three nominations (payments) are required for each animal that competes in the Fu-

turity. The first entry is made as a calf, then the second as a yearling, and final nomination as of June 1 prior to the Maryland State Fair to be entered in the Futurity. The accumulated monies will make-up the purse for any one year and be directed as prize money among the exhibitors.

The Brown Swiss Show will be on Sunday, September 3, beginning at 12:30 p.m. The Futurity class will follow class 11-dry cow five-years and over. Don't miss the judging for the "Best Two-Year-Old" of the 2000 Mid Atlantic Brown Swiss Futurity on Sunday afternoon.
