First Lehigh Roundup Sale At Allentown A Success

ALLENTOWN (Lehigh Co.) — Half the proceeds from the grand champion hog, exhibited by Timothy Billig at the Lehigh County 4-H Roundup Sale last Saturday, was donated to Lehigh County Special Olympics.

The hog was purchased for \$575 by MidAtlantic Farm Credit

it during the Lehigh County 4-H Roundup Sale conducted for the first time in recent history at the Allentown Fair.

The sale included 10 steers that averaged \$1,360, 12 lambs that averaged \$335.42, and 40 hogs that averaged \$303.38, according to show coordinator Cheryl Bennecoff, Kutztown.

A cake donated by Giant Foods was sold for \$400, purchased

by S & S Amusements and John and Dee's Fun and Games Concessions.

There were a total of 134 buyers at the sale and 29 4-H exhibitors. Auctioneer was Ralph Zetlemoyer.

Bennecoff noted that the Lehigh County 4-H livestock clubs would "like to say 'thank you' to all the support we had to have a successful sale!"
