

Scholars At Youth Institute

SHIPPENSBURG, (Cumberland Co.) — Eight scholars from the Southeast Region Council of Pennsylvania Council of Cooperatives (PCC) recently completed a four-day Youth Institute at Shippensburg University.

In attendance were Kristina Eshbach, Conestoga; Joshua Folk and Holly Moyer, Bernville; Robert Garrett, Pequea; Joel Krall and Amanda Martin, Lebanon; Lynn Stoner, Lititz; and Troy Wenger, Manheim.

Lehman Metzler of Willow Street and Debra Seibert of Ephrata accompanied the group and served as adult resource leaders for the institute. Richard Ferraioli of Royersford returned

this year as a scholar staff leader, having attended the National Institute on Cooperative Education at Snow Bird Utah, in 1999. Gerald and Julie Strickler of Myerstown were institute staff members in charge of the chorale.

The 2000 Summer Youth Institute was the 40th in a series that began in 1961. The Institute is designed to enhance scholars' understanding and appreciation of cooperatives, issues of concern to cooperatives, and develop leadership skills.

Scholars are sponsored to the institute by local and regional cooperatives operating in the southeast region.

The Summer Institute is a

joint effort of Pennsylvania Council of Cooperatives and the Penn State Cooperative Business Education and Research Program (CBERP). The program is partially supported by a Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture Youth Opportunity Grant.

Local scholars were joined by more than 80 scholars and adult resource leaders from across Pennsylvania. Institute participants join, manage, and operate MINICO's (mini-cooperative businesses) to gain hands on experience in devising a business plan, operating, and experiencing the results of their work.

Faculty and staff for the institute include cooperative leaders,

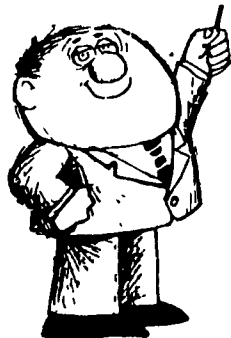
Penn State faculty and staff, agricultural education teachers, and volunteers from the cooperative sector.

Penn State Lady Lion Swimmer Melinda Rehm inspired the scholars with her personal approach and experiences in setting and achieving your goals.

In addition to cooperative basics and planned leadership-building activities, scholars learned about important issues relating to environment, regulations, and the roles of individuals, businesses, and government in achieving solutions to agricultural issues. Discussion was led by farmer activist and Farm Partnership coalition member Larry Elwood. Each MINICO group was assigned an issue

area and challenged to prepare an "action" campaign or initiative to address the problem. The four groups competed for a possible 100,000 government grant to worthy proposals. All four groups would have received some funding.

A highlight of the Institute each year is the Awards Dinner, during which nine scholars, including Joel Krall and Troy Wenger, earned scholarships to attend the 2000 National Institute on Cooperative Education (NICE) in Nashville, Tenn., July 31-August 3. Holly Moyer received the first place individual award in the talent show for singing "Edelweiss," and the entire Southeast Council received the first place talent show award for the skit that they performed.

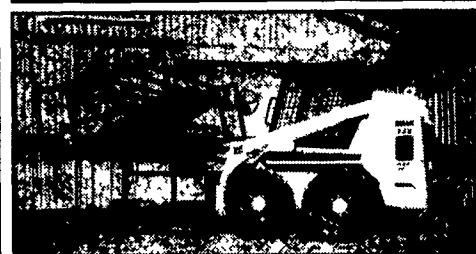
