Tiffany Dean, 14, took home reserve grand champion placing with her champion heavyweight hog. The daughter of Gary and Joan Dean, Strasburg, Dean is in the eighth grade at Martin Meylin Middle School.

Dean also competes in the sheep show ring in several fairs during the season. This year Dean's reserve champ came from a Myerstown hog farm and made an appearance at the 4-H Roundup before coming to Quarryville.

Both girls planned to sell their hogs at the fair's livestock sale.

A sales representative of Hoober Inc. in McAlisterville, Bomgardner is a Penn State dairy and animal science graduate, where he participated on the university's judging team. Bomgardner judges 5-7 shows a year.

"This hog has the biggest top, good bone, feet, and legs, and has natural skeletal width and is bold in her hip," said Bomgardner.
