

USDA Solicits Petitions To Amend Substance List In Organic Farming

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Department of Agriculture invites interested parties to peti-tion the National Organic Standards Board (NOSB) to amend the proposed National List of Allowed and Prohibited Substances (National List). Petitioners may recommend sub-stances for inclusion on or removal from the National List.

The proposed National List is a part of the March 13, 2000, revised National Organic Program (NOP) proposal. The National List is developed by the NOSB, through consultation with outside experts, and forwarded to the Secretary of Agriculture for approval.

The National List identifies substances that may or may not be used in organic production and handling operations. Specifically, the National List identifies those synthetic substances that may be used and the nonsynthetic substances that cannot be used in organic production and handling. All amendments to the proposed National List of

"Anyone may petition the NOSB," said Kathleen Merrigan, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. "Amending the National List should be a continuous process that reflects the latest body of knowledge available to the NOSB."

The NOP, NOSB, and the National List are established under authority of the Organic Foods Production Act of 1990. The act directs USDA to establish national standards governing the marketing of agricultural products as organically produced. The program's primary benefit is assurance to consumers that those products meet a consistent standard, thereby facilitating commerce in fresh and processed organically produced food.
