Short On Numbers But Long On Quality At Denver Fair

Although numbers may not be the hallmark of Denver's sheep show, top-notch animals showed up to compete in the market and breeding classes.

Judged by Dr. Robert Herr of Narvon, owner of Nix Besser farm, the Denver sheep show was marked by quality in both market and breeding sheep divisions.

"We had a very strong market show tonight," said Dr. Herr.

"Some of the best of the state are here," said Herr of the breeding sheep show. "You don't have

quite the numbers but you certainly do have the quality."

In the market lamb show, grand and reserve champions came from the heavyweight divi-

Champion showman of the Denver fair, Jen Zimmerman, 18, took "Sheree," a Horned Dorset, to the champion ewe spot over the other breeds. Zimmerman selected Sheree from more than 65 breeding and market sheep at her home farm in Reinholds.

"I think it's neat that two Dorsets won," Zimmerman said of the champion and reserve champion ewes.

Radell Peters, 17, Elizabethtown, comes to the Denver fair because of tradition. Peters won reserve champion ewe with his Dorset.

"I've been here for nine years," said Peters. "It's a nice show, a fun show, there's no pressure.'

"It's a laugh-, have-fun, showyour-sheep fair," agreed Zimmerman.

Show grand champion ram placing went to "Dakota" and Jimmy Zimmerman, 16, also of Reinholds. Zimmerman also shows beef on the show ring circuit. Jen and Jimmy are the children of Jay and JoAnn Zimmerman.

First-timers and experienced show ring sheep paired up to win in the class. Sarah Boyd's "Deno" took home grand champion market lamb, a winner already this year in the show ring, and Ryan Donough's "Autumn" won reserve champion in the lamb's first show ring appearance. Donough, 16, Manheim, is debating about taking Autumn, actually born in the spring, to more of the season's upcoming

"I wasn't sure how she was going to do," said Donough. " I was pretty surprised."

Boyd, 19, Ephrata, is a sophomore elementary education major at Millersville University. This is her 11th show ring season. Besides winning the market lamb show, Boyd took home champion pair of market lamb honors. Andrew Gerhart took home reserve champion. Boyd also won reserve champion showman.

Many of the Denver fair's sheep show participants will be showing their animals at the upcoming Ephrata, New Holland and Manheim fairs.


