Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was fair to moderate and noted as sufficient in keeping the 3 pound and lighter weights cleared satisfactorily. Heavier sizes were fully adequate to ample and were competitively priced in many instances to stimulate buyer interest. Live supplies were moderate; weights were light to heavy, mostly desirable to heavy. Processing schedules were moderate to moderately heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 47 to 61 cents. Trade sentiment was about steady. All parts were generally noted as adequate. Wings, gizzards and livers cleared best and bone-in breasts were in better balance.

Soybean bids fell slightly lower, despite the overnight export sale to Taiwan. This, however, doesn't put this weeks total very high. Harvest progress continued to pressure bids.

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

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


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
