This dairy journey was divided into four sections. Each section provided fun facts about various dairy issues.

At the first section, participants were able to meet a cow. For Andrew Nauss, 8, of Mechanicsburg and Michael Snyder, 6, of Boiling Springs, this was their first time to touch a cow. As Andrew brushed the cow, he de-

scribed the cow as being much bigger than he expected. "It's soft when I pet down, but not when I pet up," explained Michael.

Club member Mandy Jewart of Home described the types of feed at the third section of the exhibit At the fourth and final section of the dairy journey, PSU member Jane Ansell of Scottdale explained the types of food products made from milk and the nutritional value of these products.
