Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was mostly fair and centered on the adequate to closely cleared supply of 3 to 3.5 pound sizes. Seller offerings were sufficient for current trade needs. Live supplies were moderate, with weights in a full range, but mostly desirable to heavy. Processing schedules were moderate to heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were 1 cent higher at 50 to 64 cents. Trade sentiment was steady. Supplies of boneless skinless breast were fully adequate to ample and competitively priced to stimulate interest. Wings were in close balance and clearing. Other items were at least adequate.

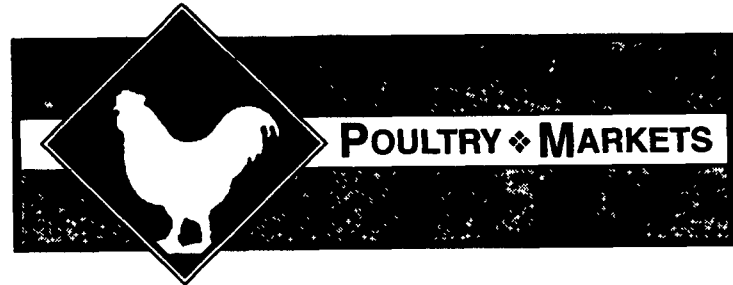
