Penn State To Conduct Dairy Nutrition Workshop

GRANTVILLE (Dauphin Co.) — The Dairy and Animal Science Department at Penn State will conduct a two-day dairy nutrition workshop here at the Holiday Inn.

The workshop, Nov. 14-15, will feature a variety of speakers from Penn State as well as other noted speakers.

The first day will feature Dr. Bill Weiss of the Ohio State University, along with Drs. Gabriella Varga and Jud Heinrichs. They will give updates on nutrition in the areas of the lactating ow, dry cow, and heifer.

In the afternoon, a variety of workshop sessions will cover topics on computer ration balancing, forage quality, water quality, interpretations of DHIA records, an update on NCR, and commenting on farm labor management.

There will be a trade show of feed industry suppliers and other allied industries of interest to nutritionists.

The second morning of the workshop will be devoted to nutrition interactions related to lactating cow health, dry cow health, facilities, reproduction, and reproductive diseases. Dr. Mike O'Connor, Dan McFarland, Dr. David Griswold, and Dr. David Wolfgang of Penn State, and Dr. Elliot Block of Church and Dwight Corp. will cover these topics.

The afternoon will again feature a variety of workshops featuring case studies related to nutrition and health or reproduction. A computer lab will feature a feed cost control program and another workshop will cover getting feeding strategies accomplished on the farm.

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


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USDA Increases Fees For Services

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The USDA announced recently that current laboratory service fees will increase for testing of agricultural commodi-

The increase is needed to strengthen the program's operating reserve and to alleviate the increased costs associated with analytical testing services. Major factors contributing to the need for the fee changes include increased employee salaries and supply costs. Current fees have been in effect since April

All tests listed in the fee schedules will increase by 24.1 percent. In addition, the hourly rates for analyses not listed in the fee schedules will increase from \$36.26 to \$45.00. Laboratory fees for aflatoxin analysis will be adjusted according to the procedure used.

Like other voluntary user-fee pro-USDA grams, provides analytical testing services in order to facilitate the marketing and quality standards of agricultural commodities in domestic and international commerce.
