The other evening I went with my husband and son to an American Chestnut meeting of the Lancaster-Lebanon region. The members attending were mostly older retired men. They are interested in restoring the American Chestnut tree to the forests of Pennsylvania.

There is a farm in York County, entirely devoted to cross-breeding the Chinese chestnut with the American chestnut to develop a blight-free tree. At one time one out of every four trees in our forests was a chestnut. It's lumber is comparable to redwood or oak lumber and it does not rot. It has a straight grain and grew to 100 feet.

There will need to be several more generations of cross breeding before a blight-free tree is available for sale. Sportsmen like the tree as its ample supply of nuts feed deer, turkey, bear and squirrels. In the early 1900s before the blight struck, railroad cars full of nuts were shipped to the big cities. They were a major cash crop for many families.

Lately, I've been baking a lot of apple cakes. One was for guests in our home. One was for a special apple dessert meeting and another was for a funeral meal at our church. I enjoy baking but I am ready to try another recipe. Maybe, I'll dig out my gingerbread cake recipe from long ago.
