From changing tires on an official NASCAR racecar to scaling a rock-climbing wall, intriguing possibilities for the adventurous are abundant. Students are exposed to the latest science, busihigh-tech ness, and advancements. Exhibitors spend time with students helping them learn about current developments in varied areas ranging from hydroponic gardening to computer simulations.

For the 34th consecutive year, the National FFA Foundation set a record level of support for FFA and agricultural education programs. R. W. Porter, chairman of the foundation board, announced the Foundation had raised \$7,675,000 in 2000 to support annual projects and programs for FFA and ag education-an all-time record. Since 1944, the National FFA Foundation has provided more than \$99 million to FFA members for awards, scholarships, and achievement programs.

FFA is a national youth organization of 455,306 students preparing for leadership and careers in the science, business, and technology of agriculture with 7,226 local chapters in all 50 states, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.
