
1 cup (2 sticks) butter 2 cups sugar 3 cups flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 8 egg whites 1 cup milk

utes Frost as desired. Makes 1 (3-layer)



Compared to last week: Feeder steers steady. Feeder heifers steady to 2.00 lower. Steer and heifer calves steady. Demand good for all classes. Quality plain to average. Many cattle off feed bunks due to the lack of wheat. Cattle in medium to fleshy conditions and calves carrying considerably more flesh than last week. Weigh-ups gaunt to average. Light receipts in Oklahoma this fall season is mostly the result of August-October drought which caused calves and yearlings to move early in this area. Slaughter cows 1.00-3.00 higher. Slaughter bulls 2.00 higher. Packer demand moderate Total of 280 cows and bulls sold with 60 percent going to packers.

Receipts this week 6464; last week 14,652; last year 10,402.

Supply consisted of 46 percent calves and yearlings over 600 lbs; 50 percent calves under 600 lbs. 4 percent cows and bulls. Heifers comprised 41 percent of feeder and calf supply.
