LOOK BEFORE YOU LEAP

That is, go straight from February 28 into March 1 this year. Many people know that Leap Years are divisible by four; last year we learned that the century years have to be divisible by 400. (2000 was a Leap Year, but 1700, 1800, and 1900 were not.) The even decades have three leap years (2000, 2004, 2008) but the odd decades



have just two (1992, 1996). 2001 Another clue is that if the first and last day of the vear are the same day of the week (Jan. 1, 1999 and Dec. 31, 1999 were both Fridays), then it's not a Leap Year, but if the days

differ, it is a Leap Year. So now you know when to leap. If you leap into a well, Providence is not bound to fetch you out.




