noinciding with the first day of Passover this year, Palm Sunday (April 8) marks the beginning of Holy UWeek in the Christian calendar Palm branches were said to have been placed on the ground before Christ for his entry into Jerusalem, and even before then, palms carried ceremonial meaning. In medieval Europe, palm

branches were ritually blessed and distributed among churchgoers The British poet and classical scholar A E Housman (1859–1936) wrote of the English custom of substituting pussy willows "Afield for palms the girls repair, / And sure

enough the palms are there, / And each will find by hedge or pond / Her waving silver-tufted wand " The anemone, called

the passe flower, has also been associated with Passover

The wood anemone never opens its petals but when the wind blows, hence its name.

PROSCIUTTO-WRAPPED ASPARAGUS

3 dozen asparagus spears 2 tablespoons olive oil 2 cloves garlic, minced salt and pepper 9 thin slices proscutto 12 wooden or metal skewers

Dreheat oven to 450°F Trim the asparagus, arrange in rows of 6 spears, and poke two skewers perpendicularly through the

rows (The result will look like a raft) Mix olive oil, garlic, and salt and pepper Place asparagus on a broiler pan and drizzle with olive oil mixture Roast, turning two or three times, until tender Remove from heat Wrap 4 spears in a slice of prosciutto and serve


