Compared to last week: Feeder steers steady to 3.00 higher. Feeder heifers steady. Most advance given on 6 weight steers that will feed into the fall markets. Demand good for feeder cattle. Demand continues excellent for stockers and calves. Stocker and calf supply generally showing an increased number of fleshy new crops, however a large number of thin stockers continue in the consist. Quality mostly average. Weigh-ups average. Feeder cattle in thin to medium flesh, few fleshy; calves and stockers in the complete range of thin to fleshy.

Slaughter cows and bulls steady to 1.00 lower. Packer demand moderate. Demand good for cows returning to the country which comprised bulk of cow supply. Total of 485 cows and bulls sold with 20 percent going to packers.

Receipts this week 8269; last week 8368; last year 8259.

Supply consisted of 53 percent yearlings over 600 lbs; 41 percent calves and light yearlings under 600 lbs; 6 percent cows and bulls. Heifers comprised 49 percent of feeder and calf supply.
