 Grain and soybean bids moving back toward year ago levels. Wheat steady to 3 cents lower. Corn mostly steady to 4 cents lower. Sorghum 9 cents higher. Soybeans mostly 1 to 5 cents higher.
 Recent hot, dry, windy weather pushed wheat bids higher. However, cooling temperatures and rains in the forecast lowered bids for today.
 Wheat quotes are still considerably above a year ago. This reflecting reduced acreage and relatively poor crop conditions. No huge export announcements this week. River barge traffic expected to be back near normal soon. Corn planting virtually completed and producers in most areas fulfilled early intentions. Some low lying flooded bottom grounds yet to be planted and it is getting rather late in the season. Rains in the forecast will perk up the recently emerged seedlings. A decent export announcement on the books today. Corn bids substantially below this time a year ago and should be drawing foreign interest. Soybean pro-

ducers are busy completing planting. Rains may temporarily halt the drills but it is plenty early yet for seeding soybeans. Big US acreage intended to be planted and good South American crops dropping bids significantly, nearly 15 percent, under a year ago. Now this should really get exporters attention but we are in a global market and prices are down everywhere.
