

BLANKET THOSE BERRIES

Ruled by Venus, according to 17th-century herbalists, strawberries were once used in remedies for gargles, and cooling drinks. In 1615, Captain George Waymouth noted that on the Maine island of Monhegan, "all along the shore...grow plentifully raspberries, gooseberries, strawberries, roses, currants, [and] wild vines." Today's crops seem to require more

tending, particularly a good mulching once the spring soil has warmed. Grass clippings or other organic matter are common, but where slugs and fruit rot are problems, landscape cloth may be preferable. Ask your local garden nursery for advice.

TIP OF THE WEEK

Remove runners from strawberry plants every two weeks to encourage large berries.

ROASTED BEETS AND ARUGULA

2 pounds beets handful of fresh thyme (about 2 dozen sprigs), chopped 4 cloves garlic, minced 1/2 cup fresh orange juice 1/4 cup herb-flavored or other vinegar sait and pepper, to taste 1/4 cup olive oll 2 tablespoons red-wine vinegar 1/2 teaspoon grated orange zest 2 large bunches arugula, chopped

1 cup grated fresh Parmesan

Preheat oven to 400°F. Trim beets, combine with fresh thyme, garlic, orange juice, the ¹/₄ cup vinegar, salt, and pepper. Cover and roast for 1 hour. Peel and cube beets. Combine olive oil, redwine vinegar, and zest.

Add arugula, toss, and s p r i n k l e cheese on top.


