Daily National Grain Market Summary

Grain and soybean bids were sharply lower in reaction to beneficial moisture drove bids. However above normal temperatures in Corn belt areas can cause problems for pollination, limited declines. Wheat bids were mixed 4 cents lower to 2 cents higher. Corn 4 to 9 cents lower. Sorghum 15 cents lower. Soybean bids 12 to 15 cents lower.

Wheat prices slightly lower as spillover pressure from corn and soybean markets. Corn bids sharply lower due to expected rainfall overnight. But above normal temperatures lending light support in corn complex. Soybean bids were sharply lower as profit taking was noted. Another day of up and down closes for soybeans, with timely rains and profit

If your outdoor lights are on timers, adjust them for summer's shorter nights.

GREEN-TOMATO SALSA
1 red pepper, seeded and roasted
2 jalapeño peppers, seeded and roasted
4 or 5 large green tomatoes
2 small onions, chopped
3 cloves garlic
1 teaspoon sugar
1 teaspoon cumin
1/2 cup fresh cilantro or parsley salt and pepper, to taste

Blacken seeded peppers and jalapeños on a grill or under the broiler, turning until skins can be peeled. Combine all ingredients and chop coarsely. Season to taste, then refrigerate for at least 3 hours. Serve chilled, with chips.
