Monthly Record High For Red Meat Production In October

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Both beef production and pork production set new records during October sending total red meat production to a new record high for the month.

Commercial red meat production for the U.S. totaled 4.26 billion pounds in October, up 4 percent from the 4.10 billion pounds produced in October 2000 and 164 million pounds above the previous record high set in 2000, according to the National Agricultural Service (NASS).

October 2000 contained 22 weekdays (including one holiday) and four Saturdays. October 2001 contained 23 weekdays (including one holiday) and four Satur-

Beef production, at 2.39 billion pounds, was 2 percent above the previous year and 43 million pounds above the previous record high set in 2000. Cattle slaughter totaled 3.16 million head, up 1 percent from October 2000. The average live weight was up 16 pounds from the previous year, at 1,247 pounds.

Veal production totaled 18 million pounds, 2 percent below October a year ago. Calf slaughter totaled 93,700 head, down 3 percent from October 2000. The average live weight was 5 pounds above last year, at 317 pounds.

Pork production totaled 1.84 billion pounds, up 7 percent from the previous year and also 121 million pounds above the previous record high set in 2000. Hog kill totaled 9.33 million head, 5 percent above October 2000. The average live weight was 5 pounds above the previous year, at 267

Lamb and mutton production, at 20 million pounds, was up 6 percent from October 2000. Sheep slaughter totaled 288,500 head, 3 percent above last year. The average live weight was 137 pounds, up 3 pounds from October a year ago.

January-Öctober red meat production was 37.9 billion pounds, 2 percent below the previous year. Accumulated beef production was down 4 percent from last year, veal was down 10 percent, pork was up 1 percent from last year, and lamb and mutton was down 3 percent.




