EXPORT MARKET HIGHLIGHTS: Demand and trading was active on drum skins while the balance of items are sluggish. Inquiry noted from Asia, Caribbean and Russia. Frozen thigh meat remains weak.

There were no drastic moves in today's markets, wheat and soybean remained about steady and soybean continued to hold firm. Traders are anticipating Friday's USDA production and stock reports wheat steady to 1 cent higher. Corn steady to 1 cent higher. Sorghum steady. Soybeans 1 to 4 cents higher.

Mostly steady wheat bids were due to traders position squaring ahead of the upcoming government reports due out Friday. Some concerns exist for hard red winter wheat crops as warm weather returns to forecasts.

Continued chaos in Argentina and dry weather in South America remain pressure factors in corn and soybean bids. Spillover strength in bean pits over the past couple of days kept bids firm. Export sales are slow again this week.

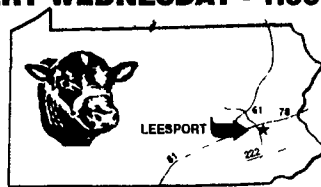
