Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was moderate and clearing the market at a reasonable rate. Demand was moderate with average buyer interest and trading. Live supplies were moderate for the market being reported on an estimated slaughter of 1,366,000 compared to 1,365,000 last Tuesday. Weights were desirable. Processing

schedules were moderate. Actual slaughter for Jan. 7-12 was 7,234,548 with an average weight of 5.04. Supply of wings were moderate for the market being reported while demand is good and more active than normal.

Negotiated F.O.B. dock prices, 2 pounds and heavier ice-packed broilers and fryers, trucklot sales of US Grade A or equivalent were steady to higher at .49 - .64 per pound; less than trucklot sales .53 - .71 per pound.

Undertone on fresh tom breast meat steady to weak, destrapped tenderloins and frozen tom breast meat steady Offerings of fresh tom breast meat continued to exceed the limited buyer interest. Destrapped tenderloin demand slow with any offerings held with confidence. The undertone on breast trim was steady at best and scapula steady to instances weak. Offerings available with some scapula offered at 105-107 cents delivered. Mechanically separated turkey (MST) offerings were ample Domestic trading was slow on all items Export trading centered on a fair volume of fresh 15-20%, most at 13 cents delivered, balance slow.

The market tone was firm. Demand was moderate to good, best where featured. In the Philadelphia vicinity, extra large eggs were advertised at 79 cents per dozen. Supplies were adequate to mostly close for current trade requirements. Breaking stock supplies were fully sufficient to short and demand was moderate. Light type hens were at least adequate for processing needs

Offerings from production areas were adequate for needs, with the occasional discount mentioned to clear a problem load. Live supplies were tightening in some areas due to the cold weather a few weeks ago. Weights were usually desirable.

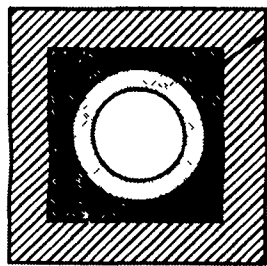
