organization moves out, he said. In addition several offices are undergoing renovation. The conference room will be moved downstairs as the current conference room is made into offices.

Leon Ressler, Lancaster County extension director, gave a report from the scholarship committee. This year six \$1,000 scholarships were awarded from the Esbenshade Trust Fund.

> These scholarships can be extended for three addit onal years if the students con-

tinue to meet set criteria. To date 396 scholarship winners have a total of \$336,300 of awarded money.

In addition to the six new winners, this year the committee awarded extensions to 16 previous scholarship winners.

According to Ressler applications for 2002 will soon be mailed out to guidance counselors and teachers across the county.

Also during the evening Fay Miller, Lancaster, was honored for her almost four years of service as building manager at the banquet. Linda Armstrong, Lancaster, is now the building manager.

Additionally Luke Brubaker, Mount Joy, will be succeeded by John Moose, Lititz, as president as Moose begins serving as president for 2002.

Brubaker provided a slide presentation of a recent trip to the Ukraine for Citizens Network for Foreign Affairs, a nonpartisan, nonprofit group working to stimulate economic growth in developing countries.

"My job was to help the Ukrainians rebuild, rethink, cooperate, and believe in themselves again,"

Brubaker's specific mission was to help build cooperatives and aid in cooperation between the farmers and government, he

said. During his stay he visited farms, conducted seminars, made recommendations, and built business plans for farms.

A small farm cooperative hosted him for the first leg of his three-week trip. Brubaker helped them to distinguish that they were not a collective farm but farmers joined together in a cooperative.

He showed the audience slides of the antiquated farming equip-
