Lancaster Family History Conference Is April 6

LANCASTER (Lancaster Co.) - On April 6, Dorothy A. Boyd-Rush will open the 23rd annual Lancaster Family History Conference with a keynote address on "The Great Philadelphia Wagon Road." This major migration route of the Colonial period stretched from southeastern Pennsylvania to Maryland, to the Valley of Virginia and on into the Carolinas.

Many different ethnic and religious groups sought new homes along this route.

Boyd-Rush is professor of history at James Madison University in Virginia and has lectured widely at historical and genealogical conferences.

Among the 20 session options are seminars on using photographs, Mennonites in Hesse and Waldeck, using old newspapers, computers and cemetery research, documenting your house, and a look at how Pennsylvania county boundaries have changed over the years.

One seminar in each track guides the beginning genealogist. A special feature includes opportunities for individualized consultation with experts, including consultation on antique German and French documents.

The conference begins on April 5 with a bus trip to Washington, D.C., led by staff members of the Lancaster County History Society. Visits are possible to the National Archives and the Daughters of the American Revolution Library.

A banquet on Saturday evening, April 6, will offer a catered meal and a slide-illustrated lecture entitled "Marking Time," by Cory Amsler, curator of the Mercer Museum in Doylestown. Amsler will explore the many reasons people sign and date the objects they made, owned, or used.


