National Feeder Cattle Weekly Summary St. Joseph, Mo. March 1, 2002

Report Supplied By USDA NATIONAL FEEDER CATTLE SUMMARY for week ending Mar. 1. Receipts: 158,200 head, last week 191,400; vear ago 180,200. Reported volume included 49 percent weighing over 600 lbs. Compared to last week, feeder steers and heifers over 700 lbs sold 1.00-3.00 lower in slow trading. Calves and stocker cattle were mostly steady with good demand from graze-out wheat and spring grass interests. However, southeastern auctions experienced losses of up to 3.00 on all weights of feeder cattle and calves. Cooler temperatures in the South reduced receipts and made it hard for order buyers to put loads together, also the expected winter weather on the Plains made customers hesitant to receive shipped-in cattle. Pressure on heavyweight feeders was unmistakable near the major feeding areas with ample supplies ready to come off wheat. Despite dry conditions, weight gains have been outstanding as the short

wheat had plenty of power. Many of these cattle have yet to be contracted as producers continue to reject lower country bids Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas auctions are expecting big receipts with so many cattle still up for sale.

Current feedlot placements will be based off of June Live Cattle futures. which are nearly 5.00 lower than April. February contracts left the board this week at 70.37, after tendering 777 loads for delivery. Buyers are determined to buy feeders that will hedge for protection amid uncertainty over the Johnson Amendment that would outlaw packer owning, feeding, or controlling livestock any longer than 14 days prior to slaughter. This is the latest of the government's attempts to level the playing field and ensure a future for independent livestock producers, which follows mandatory reporting and country of origin product labeling. The Johnson Amendment appears like a quick fix, on the surface, to the fear of complete consolidation. However, the ramifications of this law are hard to predict and may end up backfiring on producers.

One thing is for sure, a lot of big money will disappear from feeder and stocker cattle markets, as private feeders are not in the habit of buying cattle that are sure to lose money. Packer affiliated feeders have more options and more interested in making sure they have a steady supply of finished livestock. However, many cow/ calf producers have already stated that they are willing to give up these record calf prices to ensure a future for them and their families. There is no doubt that if this amendment becomes part of the new Farm Bill it will be a major change to the cattle industry, but the effect on the hog industry will be twice as severe.
