The group participates in water monitoring efforts, watershed education, and stream restoration projects, and in the future hopes to complete an overall watershed assessment using the data they have collected.

Also at the banquet, PA DEP Secretary David Hess was on hand to present the president of PACWA, Arlie Steigman, with a Governor's Award for Excellence. Describing Arlie as "a force of nature," Hess explained that she has been involved in environmental projects for a large part of her 86 years.

This year, the Lancaster County Conservation District will also host its annual Conservation Expo in conjunction with Oregon Dairy Days.


The Chamber's annual Family Farm Days event is scheduled from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m.
