Wheat bids continued to climb upward

as crop concerns offer support.

Weather forecasts are calling for warmer, dry conditions in hard red winter wheat areas while soft red winter wheat growing regions expect more unwanted moisture. The Kansas Wheat tour group reported better than expected conditions in Nebraska and central Kansas. The wheat crop in Western Kansas and Colorado, however, is in dire need of moisture.

Corn bids gained more ground today as planting delays continue in the eastern Corn Belt. Traders believe it's too early to become overly concerned but were glad to see some strength back in the market. Export demand remained slow overnight for

Soybean bids are back on their usual roller coaster, moving slightly lower on slow export demand and delayed progress in corn planting. Active harvest in South America also weighed on US bean bids. 




