down to \$1.03 per pound this week at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. The good news is that butter imports have fallen behind year-ago levels. Lower domestic prices have reduced the demand for imports. But world butter prices are also weak, at \$0.45 per pound. Butter prices will likely increase in the U.S., but only after summer heat increases the demand for ice cream and reduces butterfat production.

Cheese inventories are also higher than expected. Stocks of American cheese in April were up 1 percent relative to a year ago, whereas "other cheese" inventories were up 16 percent. Official numbers for commercial disappearance were not available this week from USDA, but there are many reports that consumer demand for mozzarella cheese is weak so far this rear That may explain why "ther cheese" in ventories are growing.

Cheese prices are weak but holding steady. Block cheese prices at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange were \$1.20 per pound,

and barrel cheese prices rose to \$1.17 per pound by week's end.

The futures market is expecting butter and cheese prices to rebound somewhat this summer and fall. The Class III futures at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange (as of April 25, 2002) shows a low of \$10.65 per CWT in June and a peak of \$12.55 in September. The concern, however, is that September Class III milk futures were \$13.50 per CWT about a month ago. The market is expecting some price weakness.
