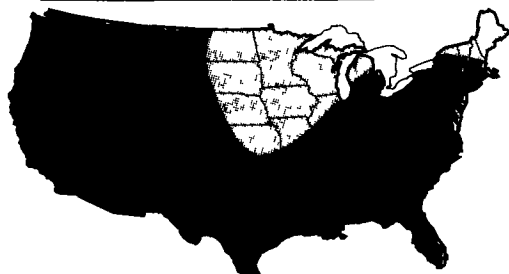

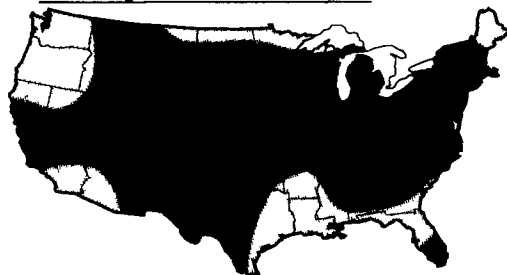

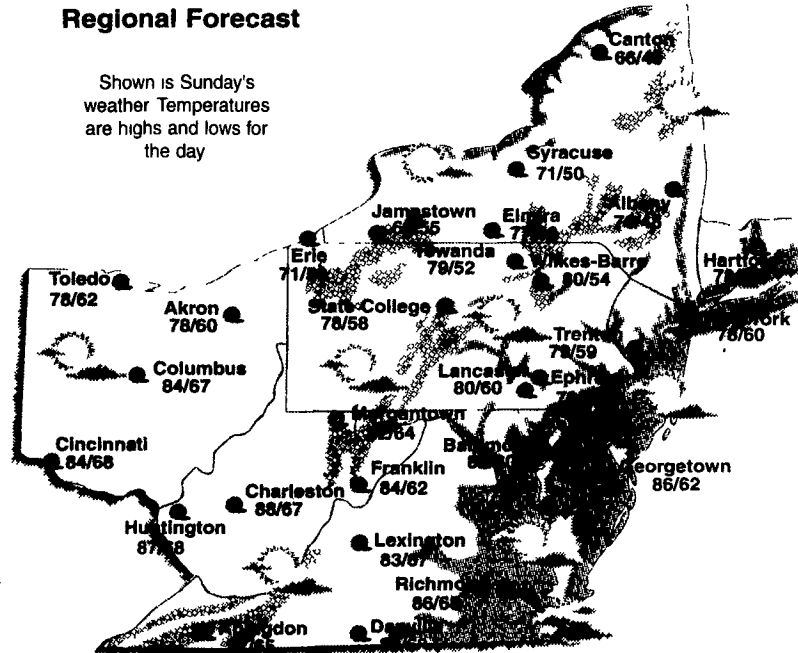

Regional Forecast

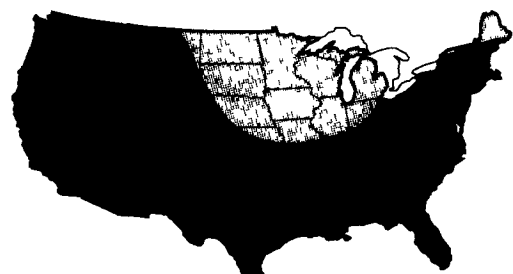
Shown is Sunday's weather. Temperatures are highs and lows for the day.

Friday, June 14, 10 am to 3 pm, Rain or Shine

Focus will be on THE PROFIT POTENTIAL OF WELL MANAGED GRASS ON A LIMITED ACREAGE DAIRY FARM

MEGA MILLET Hybrid Forage Pearl Millet is a new delayed maturing forage millet similar to Sorghum Sudan but has NO PRUSSIC ACID thus it's SAFE FOR HORSES. Yields aren't as high as MegaGreen but quality is even higher. Mega Millet should be grazed at 12 to 24 inches leaving a 6 inch stubble. Our cows pick up milk when grazing Mega Millet.

Mega Millet is widely adapted for different soil types and is very drought tolerant. It requires hot weather for maximum growth. Do not plant until soil temperature is 65 to 70 degrees.

Mega Millet similar to Sudangrass with higher quality and no prussic acid. Safe for horses.
