Wheat prices were mixed due to continued concerns over the current harvest. Hot and dry weather in Winter Wheat growing areas could have possibly damaged the crop in its final stages of development, also, showers swept through parts of the Southern Plains putting a small damper on harvesters. Heavy rains fell in parts of Illinois and Iowa Tuesday, with flooding expected, farmers trying to get those last rows of corn in may be forced to plant soybeans. Light overnight export news came in the form of a 56,000 tonne purchase from Taiwan. Firm meal and oil prices, coupled with planting delays in the Ohio Valley, continue to be supportive to the soybean markets.

Wheat mixed from 1 to 4 cents lower, to 1 to 7 cents higher. Corn steady to 1 cent lower. Soybeans 2 to 5 cents higher. Sorghum steady to 2 cents lower.
