1 cup whipping cream 3/3 cup packed brown sugar

²/₃ cup butter

1 cup (6 ounces) semisweet chocolate chips

1 cup chopped pecans Ice cream

In a saucepan over medium heat, bring cream, brown sugar and butter to a boil; stirring constantly. Reduce heat; simmer for 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove form the heat; stir in the chocolate chips until melted and smooth. Stir in pecans. Serve warm over ice cream. Store in the refrigerator. Yield: 3 cups.



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
