Prices remained unchanged on the balance of sizes. The market tone was mixed, mostly steady to fully steady on the larger sizes, however the smaller sizes ranged barely steady to weak. Demand was light to moderate. Supplies were adequate to available for needs. Breaking stock offerings were adequate to ample for the light to moderate demand. Light type hens were fully adequate to ample for processing needs.

Trade sentiment on fresh white meat items was steady to instances fully steady, frozen steady to barely steady. Fresh demand was light to instances fair, frozen slow. Offerings of fresh white meat ranged light to adequate, frozen adequate to ample with wing meat in the longest position. Some increased activity was noted on fresh mechanically separated turkey for post holiday needs at mostly steady price levels. Domestic and export trading centered on a moderately heavy volume of fresh mechanically separated turkey for current shipments, balance slow.

Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds continued disappointingly light and unaggressive. Offerings remained fully adequate to ample, and where excess supplies were available, they were generally difficult to place. Live supplies were seasonally moderate; weights were light to heavy, mostly desirable to heavy. Processor schedules were moderate to moderately heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 52 to 64 cents. Trade sentiment was barely steady. In the parts complex, all items were in a range of fully adequate or readily available for the limited buyer interest.


National Broiler Market At A Glance

Trade sentiment remained no better than steady. Demand into retail was slow to fair, best for limited features, and food service fair to good, strongest for fast food promotions and delis. Supplies were at least adequate or available for trade needs. In the parts structure, availability easily exceeded demand resulting in a light and cautious buying interest. Breast items and wings were available, yet had increased in some instances. Dark meat was fully adequate to ample and continued slow to clear. In production areas, live supplies were moderate at weights in a full range, but mostly desirable. In parts of the West, live weights were affected due to extremely hot temperatures.


