I SCREAM, YOU SCREAM...

Many consider July 23, 1904, to be the official date when the ice-cream cone was invented, and that the clever individual was Ernest A. Hamwi. The cone was introduced at the World's Fair in St. Louis, Missouri, later that year, and the idea caught on. Others recognize Italo Marchiony as the inventor, who developed a similar idea in 1896 for which he received a patent in 1903. Ice cream itself probably derives from the flavored "water ice" of 17th-century Italy. English colonists brought the sweet frozen delicacy to America, where early settlers made ice cream in pewter bowls set in ice and salt. The first commercial ice-cream factory opened in 1851.

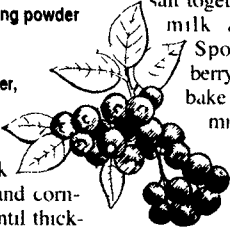
TIP OF THE WEEK

BLUEBERRY COBBLER

- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/2 cup water
- 3 cups blueberries
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter, softened

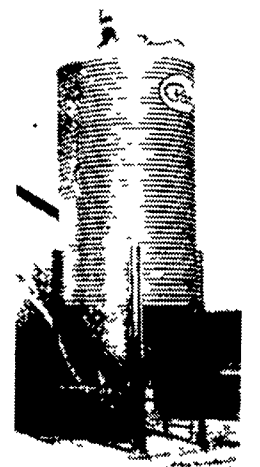

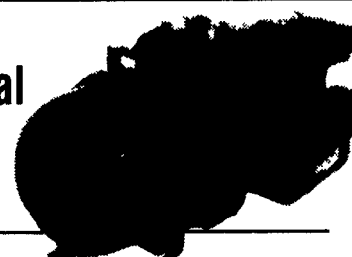

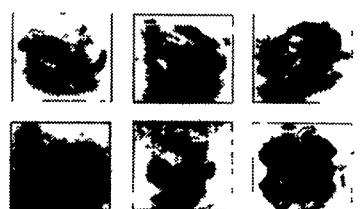
