To inform farmers as well as agribusinesses in today's marketplace, John Berry, Lehigh County agricultural marketing agent, said they have assembled international leaders in the commodity marketing industry to present and discuss their views on what the future holds.

"The world's agricultural and food industry is expanding and remains in a constant state of change," Berry said. "Successful businesses and institutions must deal with rapidly shifting market conditions that are driven by international influences, technological innovations, policy shifts, weather conditions, emerging consumers and fluctuating consumer preferences. To continue

succeeding in this environment, businesses must have access to reliable information and understand its use."

During this seminar, according to Berry, there will be discussions on identifving marketing goals, managing price risk, tracking global mar-kets and industry changes, evaluating strategies to meet financial requirements and better management of the bottom line.

Featured speakers include experts from the Sparks Companies, Inc., a recognized world leader in broad based agricultural and commodity research, analysis and consulting. They include William J. Peterlin has consulting contracts with major grain processing companies, and provides a daily weather and crop analysis titled, "Against the Grain" and on-air comments on weather and crop impact on the Illinois Farm Bureau Radio Network.

August 7 and 8 will find the Washington County tractor pullers at the grandstand area for a tractor and truck pull beginning at 7 p.m.


