In most areas, prices were higher on mediums and continued unchanged on the remainder of sizes. The market tone was in a full range of steady to firm. Demand was light to at times good with best movement where features were a factor. Supplies of the larger sizes were adequate while mediums were closely balanced. However, in California jumbo and extra large were reported as tight due to hot weather and heavy molting of older birds. Breaking stock offerings were adequate to tight for the light to moderate demand. Light type hens were fully adequate for normal processing schedules.

Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was moderate and clearing the market at a reasonable rate. Demand was moderate with buyer interest and trading. Live supplies was moderate for the market being reported with an estimated slaughter of 1,346,000 compared to 1,336,000 last Tuesday. Weights were desirable. Processing schedules were moderate. Supply of wings was short and below average for the market being reported while demand was very good and offerings being rapidly absorbed. Actual slaughter for the week of 9-2-9-7-2002 was 5,484,040 head with an average weight of 4.86.

Negotiated F.O.B. dock prices, 2 pounds and heavier ice-packed broilers and fryers, trucklot sales of US Grade A or equivalent were steady to higher at .47 -.59 per pound; less than trucklot sales .48 -.65 per pound.

Trade sentiment was fully steady to firm in the East, steady elsewhere. Demand into all areas was unaggressive to moderate, trading was mixed, with regular commitments usually sufficient for trade requirements. Supplies in the East were in balance to well cleared, but at least adequate in the remaining areas.
In the parts structure, wings and tenders were well cleared to tight and moving, and all other white meat items were more available to at times slow to clear. Dark meat moved into a better position, but was obtainable if needed. In production areas, live supplies were moderate. Weights were light to heavy, mostly desirable.

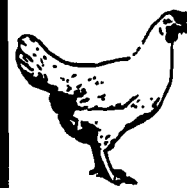
