

ANSWER - A reader requested instructions on how to dry flowers in the microwave. Thanks to Shirley Orfanella, Quarryville, for sending in instructions, but she writes that of the 5 or 6 drying methods she uses, the microwave is her least favorite but it's fast. Perhaps Shirley could send instructions for her favorite methods. Here is the microwave instructions: Cover the turntable with kitchen paper and arrange flowers in a single layer making sure no two items touch. Process on low about 3 minutes. Time will depend on type of flowers and micro wattage. Check ever 30 seconds near end of time. Remove when crisp. A few seconds too long will make them too brittle. Best to experiment with your least favorites.
