The New York Beef Industry Council (NYBIC) was fortunate to again have volunteers from the American National CattleWomen, National Beef Ambassador program, Nebraska Cattlemen. and New York State to help with the sampling efforts. During the course of the fair the NYBIC served 39,892 samples; 8,235 samples were served on Beef Day alone. Additionally, the American National CattleWomen conducted 15 cooking demonstrations with two recipes each session.

Beef Day is an eagerly anticipated event, as local media and beef producers join together to promote the benefits of beef. This year, Beef Day began with NY-BIC's appearance on Syracuse's WIXT Daybreak Show. The
