

DES MOINES, Iowa - A federal judge's ruling in Michigan recently that the Pork Checkoff program is unconstitutional is a blow to the pork industry, said Craig Christensen, an Iowa pork producer and vice president of the National Pork Board.

"Obviously, the producer members who make up the National Pork Board are extremely disappointed by the ruling," said Christensen, a pork producer from Ogden, Iowa.

The Department of Justice and the Department of Agriculture will continue to review the

court's decision in order to determine the next step in the process, Christensen said.

Judge Richard Enslen of the United States District Court for the Western District of Michigan ruled on Oct. 25 that the checkoff is unconstitutional and that all collections of the checkoff are to cease by Nov. 25.
