## DairyCOP\$: Measure It, Manage It

LANCASTER (Lancaster Co.) — When it comes to running a dairy farm, "you have to be able to measure it to manage it," said Brad Hilty, senior extension associate with Penn State Dairy Alliance.

DairyCOP\$, or Dairy Cost of Production Analyzer, could be just the tool.

Hilty spoke to several dairy producers during a DairyCOP\$ Workshop for dairy owners and operators in early November at the Farm and Home Center.

The DairyCOP\$ program is simple: how much does it cost a dairy farmer to produce 100 pounds of milk?

Hilty noted that there are several key items to the program. A producer needs to look at the feed, a "big chunk of the production cost," he noted, in addition to labor and overhead.

Those elements are inputted via computer to a spreadsheet. Producers can compare, through the DairyCOP\$ program, how they fare compared to other producers.

One spreadsheet example looked at how Lancas-

ter County dairy farmers were doing. "They can look at the weak spots in the operation, or the strong points, and see how they're doing," said Hilty.

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
