- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Layer ingredients in jar to give, seal tightly. To reconstitute mix ingredients well. For a single serving, add 8 ounces freshly boiled water to 1/2 cup mix in heatproof mug. Stir until completely dissolved.

Beware Of Last Minute Holiday Purchases

COLUMBUS, Ohio - If you're one of the millions of consumers who still need to get their holiday shopping completed, watch out not for determined shoppers with sharp elbows, but for spending more than you bargained for.

"With the uncertainty in the job market in the year ahead, it's probably best to be generally cau-tious" about getting into too much debt, said Sharon Seiling, family resource management specialist for Ohio State University Extension and associate professor of consumer and textile sciences in the College of human ecology. She said there could be a temptation to buy it now because "it's on sale," which may over-burden the charge accounts. "Even if you

get something on sale, if it takes vou three or four months to pay it off, then it might be more expensive than if it hadn't been on sale and you were able to pay

tick to it," Seiling said. "Don't

let the holidays become a financial burden.'

She offered some guidance to keep on budget during the holidays:

Keep track of your spending, especially any purchases you put on credit. You don't want to be surprised after the holidays with a huge unanticipated bill. Take along a small notebook to record purchases and keep all receipts in an envelope.

Make a list of what you want to buy, and don't stray from it. What seems like a bargain today could easily become fodder for tomorrow's garage sale, where you sell it at a substantial

spending limits on gifts or drawing names instead of buying for everyone. "Take the opportunity to talk about holiday spending on gifts, entertainment and travel, to make sure everyone feels comfortable about what they're giving and how they're celebrating

- On the flip side, don't pressure other family members to spend more than they comfortably can. "That pressure can be subtle," Seiling said. Family members who refuse to abide by previously agreed-upon spending limits or who discourage drawing names could shame others into spending more than they can afford

This is also a good time to talk with children about the true meaning of the holidays and about reasonable expectations for gifts, Seiling said. Too often, parents feel uncomfortable about that kind of conversation, but it's one that's vital to keep children and teens aware of real-world expenses and priorities.

This is also a good time to start planning for next year's holiday spending, Seiling said. Consumers who keep good track of their spending now can form a plan to save enough money each month in 2003 to be able to pay cash for purchases next year.
