Wheat bids were supported by advances in corn and bean bids and good weekly export inspection numbers, however, year ago sales are down 7.2 miltion bushels. Corn and bean exports were up substantially from last week Overnight purchase of US Soybeans by China strengthened soybean bids. There will be no grain trade the next two days
