Miller Named Vice Chairman Of Ag Committee

HARRISBURG (Dauphin Co.) — A vocal advocate for agriculture and other issues facing Pennsylvania's rural communities, Rep. Sheila Miller (R-129) has been appointed vice chairman of the House Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committee for a third consecutive term by Speaker of the House Matthew J. Ryan (R-Delaware).
