Atlanta, Ga. January 7, 2003 Report Supplied By USDA

Trade sentiment was steady to fully steady. Retail and food service demand was light to moderate, best for limited features and into fast food; restaurants and catering businesses were fair at best. Supplies of larger sized product were more available, but clearing, and smaller sizes were better balanced to close. In the parts structure, wings had the strongest movement with inventories barely adequate to tight. Breast items and dark meat were at least sufficient with mixed interest. In production areas, live supplies were moderate at mixed, but mostly desirable weights.

The 12-City Weighted Average Price for 01/06/03 was 61.08, compared to 58.22 last week, and 56.85 a year ago.
