HERSHEY (Dauphin Co.) — Last weekend at the Hershey Lodge and Convention Center 51 contestants vied for the Pennsylvania Fair Queen title.

Cassandra (Cassie) Hay, representing the Somerset County Fair, was selected to reign over Pennsylvania's 114 fairs. Named first runner-up was Jamie Jo Orcutt, Clearfield County Fair.

Each of the 51 contestant had been a first place winner at a

local fair where more than 375 women competed.

During final competition, contestants needed to present a 3 to 5 minute speech about "Why You Should Come To My Fair."

STAUNTON, Va. — Sarah Ann Leonard's wide smile on January 22 was every bit as magnetic and engaging as the glistening tiara placed on her tresses at the 2003 Virginia State Dairy Princess Coronation, where she won the title and Ashley Shifflett was named the alternate Virginia dairy princess.

Leonard had performed a skit entitled "Joe Moola," and later commented: 'It's hard doing this in front of your friends. It's easier to embarrass yourself in front of strangers."

But, then turning serious, she added, "I enjoy living on a dairy farm and promoting (the dairy industry)."

Most shocking for the 17-year old Liberty High School junior is the statistic that 70 percent of teenage girls do not get enough calcium in their daily diets.

Perhaps her official influence as Virginia dairy princess, coupled with her position of president of the Virginia Junior Holstein Association can help to reverse the unhealthy trend.

Leonard is the fourth generation involved with the family's dairy operation and says very affectionately of the black and white cows: "I love my Holsteins." Then added that she also loves her Brown Swiss.

She believes that to make an impact for the dairy industry the dairy message must reach young people.


"I want to target the youth market to increase milk and dairy product consumption and make it a habit early in life," she said.

Leonard has gone to state and national 4-H Dairy Quiz Bowl, is active in 4-H dairy club, FFA, and shows dairy cows. She had been a dairy maid for two years.

Additionally she is active in high school cross-country, lacrosse teams, and at the Methodist church she attends.

Jeff and Patty Leonard of Midland are her parents. Her sisters Elizabeth and Katy are also dairy maids in Fauquier County.

Ashley Shifflett is the 15-year-old daughter of Larry and Susie Shifflett. The family
