One of the topics discussed at the conference was that of promoting Hispanics to supervisory positions on farms. The Jarvises said they are definitely interested in doing that at some point, but admitted they will need to work on their own Spanish language skills first.

Larry Jarvis said that having served eight years in the U.S. Army was a key experience in helping him relate to the Mexican workers.

"You just learn how to deal with people and respect them, no matter what language they speak or where they come from," he said.

Santos, Rodriguez, and de la Cruz still have family members in Mexico and said they would like to be able make an annual trip back home to visit. Jarvis said he is fine with that, but pointed out he doesn't want to lose them permanently.

"I have no problem with them going to Mexico, as long as they come back," he said.

While taking a short break from cleaning out the free-stalls, de la Cruz talked about his satisfaction in being employed at Teabow, Inc. How long does he plan to work there?

"A long time," he said.
