Supplies varied by size and region, but were overall available if needed. In the parts structure, trading was slow to fair with regular commitments usually sufficient for needs. Boneless skinless breasts were in good balance and clearing well, along with leg quarters, and the remaining items were at least adequate or available. In production areas, live supplies were moderate. Weights were desirable to heavy, mostly desirable.


