The moisture was welcomed but not so much the drop in temperature. Demand continued steady in most places. Many ingredients prices remained steady to slightly lower with Millfeed prices moderately to sharply lower due to ample supplies. Distillers dried grains supplies were tight in some areas while other producers sold their product wet for less. Last week's futures advances lent light support to some ingredients.


